The bulbs themselves look dead, get buried and God continues to work bringing new life and glorious little flowers when winter tries desperately to linger. Crocuses may be my favorites. They lined my grandmother's walk and would often determinedly poke up through the last snow to declare that spring was coming.

Daryl's favorite spring flower is the hyacinth. He has been trying to force bulbs to bloom this spring. The bulbs were placed in containers, then they went into a dark cooler, and there they stayed. When they started to show growth, he moved them to the shelf under the window by his desk. Most of the bulbs failed. Some had growth that stopped when they were moved to his office. Some of those stunted plants bloomed determinedly. Daryl's bulbs are often a reminder that new life isn't guaranteed under our careful control.

In fact, this last month has had reminders that we seem to be tightly held by violence and death. Our own community experienced the inexplicable death of three children at the hands of their father/step-father. This week, we have heard of three children and three adults shot down in a private Christian school in Nashville. We are reaching the point where mass shootings or school shootings are so common that people are personally experiencing them more than once. This is like seeing a moldy bulb - it didn't have enough of something and too much of something else. Our world experiences far too little love, hope, and joy and way too much anger, fear, hate, and violence.

Mom, on the other hand, doesn't try to force bulbs to grow on her schedule and plants them in some unexpected places. After Daddy passed away, she planted crocus bulbs at his grave. They faithfully bloom each year within a couple of days to the anniversary of his death. Mom calls this a "God wink". It is a reminder that death is not the end.

She simply planted the bulbs and trusted God to keep them blooming each year. It is a sign of her hope that God is always bringing forth new life. She may not get to control that new life, but as a gardener she gets to participate in God's work by caring for and celebrating new life. I heard this hope and joy when she and her doctor shifted from talking about her health (she's okay) to mowing their lawns, planting bulbs, and planning for what to plant next. The whole tenor of their conversation changed. He slowed down from his business voice to being himself. Her voice picked up. The rhythm of the conversation changed just like the seasons.

Easter is our reminder that God is always at work bringing forth new life – resurrection hope. Resurrection hope isn't limited to our hope of "going to heaven". Resurrection hope is confidence that God is always working to bring forth new life and gives us the opportunity to be part of that new life. As worldly ways die, our joy in Christ grows. Our life of faith is seen not in blooms but in just as varied acts of compassion, justice, and love.

My prayer for us as Christians is that we become voices that add to the peace, hope, love, and joy in the world. Christ invites us to participate in God's mission of reconciliation. The world needs to hear that "Christ is risen". The risen Christ calls for us not to just complain

about the acts of senseless violence, but to also participate with God in the face of death to bring forth new life. Our world needs to experience acts of compassion that show our love and care for all. It also needs to experience acts of justice that call the world to live in new life-giving ways. To act in the face of such tragedy requires hope. 1 Peter is a letter that proclaims our hope. Our Eastertide (the Great 50 Days of Easter) sermon series is "A Living Hope". May resurrection hope in Christ be what motivates us to participate in God's mission of reconciliation and new life. Grace and Peace. **Fastor Laura**
